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GUIDED RESEARCH

LAW 723; 1 or 2 credit hours

A student may, with the approval of the Vice Dean for Academic Affairs, undertake Guided Research (for 1 or 2 credits only), under the supervision of a Full-time faculty member; <u>OR</u>, if interested in undertaking guided research with an Adjunct Faculty member, the student must discuss this decision with Vice Dean Miller *prior to approaching the adjunct professor*. Faculty supervision shall be conducted through regular and frequent meetings. No faculty member shall supervise more than three projects in a semester. The end product shall be a paper which, after grading, shall be filed with the Registrar. The paper shall be graded by a letter grade.

Following are the Guidelines for Guided Research Projects:

- 1. Student must obtain approval of the Vice Dean for Academic Affairs no later than the last day of the Drop/Add period by providing a written research proposal approved by the supervising faculty member.
- 2. The proposal must be supervised by a Full-time faculty member, <u>OR</u> by an Adjunct faculty member <u>with prior permission</u> of the Vice Dean for Academic Affairs.
- 3. Guided Research Project Request Form (available at the Registrar's Office) must be submitted to the Vice Dean for Academic Affairs for approval, after proposal is approved by supervising faculty member.
- 4. Only available to students with a cumulative GPA of 3.00 (B) or a B+ average in the particular subject area in which the research is undertaken.
- 5. Available for 1 or 2 credits only.
- 6. No more than one subject may be undertaken in a semester.
- 7. No more than two such projects may be applied for credit towards the Juris Doctor degree.
- 8. Faculty member may supervise only three projects in a semester.
- 9. Final paper, after grading, must be filed with the Registrar.

The Research Proposal must be prepared in the following form:

- 1. Problem: A precise statement of the particular inquiry to be undertaken.
- 2. Approach: Various questions that need to be raised and investigated in order to explore the problem.
- 3. Method of inquiry: Published materials, interviews, simulations, experiments, and other methods of inquiry intended to be used.

Data: Indication of the nature of data contemplated, not a bibliography, namely:

- a. Primary data: reports, cases, hearings, case studies, and the like.
- b. Secondary data: writing of scholars.

Indication must also be made of the various disciplines, in addition to law, whose data need be investigated.
